Text: Matthew 5:7

Mercy is a builder; Jesus used him to help build a bridge from where He was to where we were. Mercy built a bridge. Mercy also builds relationships. Mercy is the act of showing compassion. Mercy is the opposite of punishment. You see, we all deserved judgement but instead God gave us mercy. Mercy and compassion seem to almost mean the same thing. And we are taught to have compassion.

This beatitude deals mostly with forgiveness; and how God showed mercy to mankind and mankind should show mercy to each other.

g A young employee secretly misappropriated several hundreds dollars of his business firm's money. When this action was discovered the young man was told to report to the office of the senior partner of the firm. As he walked up the stairs toward the administrative office the young employee was heavyhearted. He knew without a doubt he would lose his position with the firm. He also feared the possibility of legal action taken against him. Seemingly his whole world had collapsed.

Upon his arrival in the office of the senior executive the young man was questioned about the whole affair. He was asked if the allegations were true and he answered in the affirmative. Then the executive surprisingly asked this question: "If I keep you in your present capacity, can I trust you in the future?" The young worker brightened up and said, "yes, sir, you surely can. I've learned my lesson."

The executive responded, "I'm not going to press charges, and you can continue in your present responsibility." g As John Chrysostom once said, "Mercy imitates God and disappoints satan. Hewitt (346)

This mercy is a Godly mercy; it causes one to yearn and hurt for others. There are several "truths" about mercy that will help us understand it.

- I. Mercy builds an attitude of compassion.
- A. Mercy is an attitude not a response. God has an attitude of mercy, for He shows that mercy to all that call upon His name.
- B. Mercy responds to our heart. If your heart is not full of love and forgiveness then mercy will not come pouring out.
- C. The attitude of mercy demands consistency on the part of the Christian. If we are wishy-washy then we will have an unstable attitude. And scripture teaches us that a double-minded man is worthless and many times does more damage than good.

Everyone must decide how to display mercy and we can be sure that not everyone will agree on every act of mercy.

- II. Mercy builds in every situation.
- A. The action of mercy is compassion displayed. It shows mercy to every man regardless of creed, color, or nationality.

- B. Forgiveness is the main fruit of mercy. God teaches mercy to us. If we fail to show mercy and forgive, then our heavenly Father will not forgive us.
- C. We should never let a situation decide for us if we are going to be merciful. If we are to love our enemies, then we should at least forgive those who are not our enemies.

Finally, the other boy who was playing the innkeeper said, "Aw, shucks, I'm not supposed to do this, but come in anyway."

- III. Mercy builders love the finished product.

    - g On Saturday, September 18, 1982, the U.S. government released the results of a sad investigation. The government determined that an army soldier stationed in Korea had been a defector to the Communists.
